“ Terry Ann Milbert was born in 1941 in Minneapolis , MN. She was the first grandchild born into a loving Irish family. It was not unusual for her to get a great deal of attention from them. Grandmas and aunts would sit around the kitchen table drinking coffee and waiting for her to wake up from her nap. Terry was 2 years old when her father enlisted in the Navy during World War II. After the war the family moved to South St. Paul where she spent her teenage years. She graduated from South St. Paul High School in 1959 and then went on to attend the College of St. Catherine. She majored in Occupational Therapy and graduated in 1963. While in college she enjoyed synchronized swimming and working with the theater department building stage sets. After taking an extension course in therapy at the University of Minnesota, Terry decided to join the Navy as a Lieutenant JG and she spent the next 3 years working at the Great Lakes Naval Hospital. In 1967, she was discharged from the Navy and obtained a position as a therapist at St. Luke's Hospital in Milwaukee, WI. She remained in Wisconsin due to the long time friendships she had established there. When she retired, Terry did extensive genealogy research and she also enjoyed collecting coins and stamps .In addition she loved to use all her craft skills which included sewing, knitting, embroidery, crocheting, cross stitch, and pottery.

Terry will be remembered for her kindness and compassion toward others. She will be greatly missed by all the people she cared so much about, and those who deeply loved her.
